#### Dos and Don'ts of Decorating for the Cat-Friendly Home

Christmas trees, wrapped packages and holiday foods can all spell trouble for your curious cat. Make your holiday decorating cat-friendly this holiday by following these easy tips.

#### **DECORATING DO'S**

- Keep electrical cords/strands of lights taped down or inaccessible. Chewing can lead to serious electrical shock or burns.
- Anchor the tree. Most cats like to climb.
  Use fishing line to secure the top of the tree to the nearest wall to prevent tipping.
- Use Poinsettia instead of more toxic plants: Poinsettia plants, if ingested, can cause mild vomiting and gastrointestinal upset, but are much safer than other holiday plants such as mistletoe and lilies.

#### **DECORATING DON'TS**

- **Tinsel** is possibly the most dangerous holiday decoration. If your pet ingests even a few strands, they can cause potentially deadly intestinal obstructions.
- Imitation snow or "flocking" on a Christmas tree can be very hazardous to pets if ingested.
- Chemical tree preservatives, that keep trees fresh, make tree water poisonous. Avoid using them or, if you must, cover the water bowl tightly with a tree skirt, towel, aluminum foil or plastic wrap.

#### Take Precautions Against Anti-Freeze Poisoning

Each year, thousands of pets are accidentally poisoned by consuming antifreeze. Even a few teaspoons can be deadly. Cats and dogs are attracted by the sweet taste of ethylene glycol, a key ingredient in anti-freeze. Even though manufacturers have agreed to add a bittering agent, this is no guarantee that curious pets will not lick or taste the liquid. A safer alternative is antifreeze made with propylene glycol antifreeze; it's still toxic, but not deadly to pets.



#### Prevent anti-freeze poisoning by:

- Keeping pets away from vehicle and vehicle parking places.
- Keeping pets indoors or on a leash.
- Soaking up known anti-freeze spills with kitty litter, safely disposing of the mixture and rinsing the area with copious amounts of water.
- Asking for antifreeze that contains a bittering agent or is made from propylene glycol rather than ethylene glycol. These are mandated in some states, but that certainly doesn't mean that every car on the road is using these safer alternatives.

#### Symptoms of anti-freeze poisoning

Early Symptoms (30 minutes - 12 hours after ingestion):

- Nausea and vomiting
- Not eating
- Mild to severe lethargy
- Ataxia (wobbly, uncoordinated gait)
- Short, rapid movements of the eyeball
- Head or body tremors
- Increased thirst and urination

Later symptoms (12 - 24 hours after ingestion):

- Lack of urine production (caused by kidneys shutting down)
- Low body temperature
- Salivation, drooling, or ulcers in the mouth
- Vomiting and not eating
- Coma, unresponsiveness

The origins of the Siamese have been lost, but it's fairly certain to have an eastern origin. Manuscripts depicting pictures of pale-coated cats with a black mask, tail, feet and ears date back to 1350.

Siamese cats are perfect for someone who wants a pet who loves interaction and activity. They are also wonderful with children and other pets, are very intelligent and known for being vocal.

Nothing about the Siamese's appearance is round.

It's angular in every way. In contrast with all of the long physical features, its coat is short, glossy and sleek, lying close to the body with a fine texture.

Siamese tend to be heavy tartar producers and need more than average dental care.
