Looking for a Great Kitty Gift? Food Puzzles Offer Many Benefits

Food puzzles take giving kitty treats to a whole new level. These toys require that cats solve a problem or learn to maneuver the toys in a way that treats become available. A new study says that such toys can positively impact feline health and behavioral issues.

In the study, one obese cat lost weight following months of playing with a puzzle while another resolved its owner-aggression issues. According to the study, food puzzles appeal to cats' natural instinct to hunt for food, and provide mental stimulation and increased activity. Food puzzles are a great way to keep cats mentally stimulated.

We recommend using dry food morsels instead of treats as the reward. Although wet food is better for kitty's health, occasional dry food is fine and, in puzzle toys, can be a fun reward. Catnip can also be put into the mix for added kitty fun!

Feline Gifts You Make Yourself

Anyone can go to the pet supplies store for holiday cat treats and toys. But gifts that you make yourself are even more special. Here are a few ideas:

- **Outdoor critter "TV"** -- Create kitty entertainment by placing bird and small critter feeders in front of door walls and windows. Stock with plenty of bird seed, nuts and suet. Don't forget the fresh water.
- Shopping bag tunnel -- Cut holes large enough for kitty to crawl through in the bottom of paper shopping bags.
 Place bags inside each other and tape together. NEVER use plastic bags as kitty can get tangled and suffocate.

Recipe for a Feline-Safe – & Pet-Safe – Thanksgiving

With the focus on family, friends and food, Thanksgiving can create lots of distractions which can mean trouble for cats and other pets. The holiday is filled with potentially dangerous foods and other hazards that could put a damper on holiday festivities. Keep kitty and other pets out of the emergency hospital this Thanksgiving by following these rules for pet safety.

- Pack up leftovers immediately away from cats.
- NO table scraps (turkey bones can splinter and cause obstructions).
- Hide all hostess gifts.
- Create a safe haven for kitties and watch doors to prevent escape as guests come and go.
- Blow out candles or use battery-operated ones. (See <u>Cat's Meow</u> below.)

Feline Diabetes on the Rise; Easily Managed With Early Detection

Like humans, cats are susceptible to diabetes, especially as they age. Feline diabetes is on the rise, probably attributable to obesity, a more sedentary lifestyle and overreliance on dry food. The good news is that, when detected early, diabetes is highly manageable.

Signs of Feline Diabetes

- Increased water consumption, urination and appetite
- Weight loss
- Cataracts after awhile with the disease

Treatment & Management

When detected early, feline diabetes is easily managed and treated with dietary changes, glucose checks and insulin injections. If very ill upon diagnosis, some cats may require hospitalization in the beginning to stabilize them.

Lookout for These Seasonal Hazards

Preparing for winter cold and holiday festivities can lead to potentially fatal hazards for cats and other pets. Use the checklist below to make sure that winter items are properly contained and stored.



	Danger	Prevention
Antifreeze	Has a sweet taste that pets like. Many cats walk through and ingest the substance when grooming. Contains ethylene glycol which is toxic and can cause brain, kidney and liver damage. If you think that your cat has come into contact with antifreeze, immediately contact your vet or emergency hospital.	 Keep cats out of the garage or where vehicles are parked. Ask your service garage about the less toxic antifreeze replacements that do NOT contain ethylene glycol.
Holiday decorations	Cats are curious so shiny tinsel, lights and ornaments dangling on the tree are inviting. Cats can climb trees, and chew and break decorations and lights.	 Avoid using tinsel on your tree. Consider ornaments made of plastic or wood that are not fragile like glass ones. Secure your tree at the base so it's not easy to tip over.
Sub-freezing temperatures	Cats are susceptible to hypothermia and frostbite.	 Keep cats indoors during cold months. For outdoor cats, provide a safe heat source, like a heated cat house or igloo, outside.


